

11 Bespoke furniture

William Garvey

British furniture designer and master craftsman William Garvey has unveiled a range of bespoke wooden furniture that is ideal for a changing room area, relaxation space or spa suite.

One striking design is the Bespoke Walnut Dressing Table with Curvilinear Stool (right). The highly functional dressing table has three drawers and a concealed centre panel which lifts to reveal a built-in mirror with integral lighting and a power point. The ergonomically designed, handcrafted stool offers superlative comfort and posture in a contemporary style.

Another multi-functional piece is the Bespoke Coffee Table with Isolation design feature. The handcrafted design allows for three isolated tables to be either divided or united as one, creating a unique appearance in all configurations. Crafted from European walnut, the tables have robust, hidden magnets beneath the veneer to connect them together.

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12 Ametis Shower and Brassware

Graff has launched the avant-garde new Ametis shower and brassware collection in the UK.

Inspired by experiences that combine 'the density of water and its colours and the movement of waves', all products are available in either chrome, white or black.

Designed by Swiss designer Davide Oppizzi, the collection includes a shower column as well as basin and bidet mixers, supplied either with or without a self-generating LED ring that communicates the temperature of the water.

Oppizzi wanted to give the impression of fluidity and continuity, which can be seen in the one, unbroken line that forms the structure of the shower column (below). The column also includes an integrated chromotherapy system featuring RGB LED lighting within the ring, as well as body jets, a hand shower and a drench showerhead.

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13 Hand-printed wallpaper

Eley Kishimoto

The first wallpaper collection from Eley Kishimoto embraces a world of 'colour, pop and excitement'. Reinforced by the studio's 22 years of expertise in printmaking, the collection comprises 12 unique designs and is made to order in the designers' Brixton studio in London.

Founded by pioneering designers Mark Eley and Wakako Kishimoto in 1992, the Eley Kishimoto studio has reworked a number of seminal prints from its archive, including La La Lyon, a bold take on a traditional damask pattern, and Venice, Camo Chevron and Light on Lattice, which are a series of geometric-inspired prints.

Printed on non-woven paper, each roll is 55cm wide, with roll length and repeat size varying to each design. The screen printed wallpaper is intended to celebrate a desire to create handcrafted artefacts in a world of 'fast, digital production'.

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
